The Psalms Project

At the beginning of the year, we put out a call to artists in our church to contribute to an ambitious project; to write original songs and create visual artwork to accompany each of the 15 Psalms that would be part of our summer sermon series. Our creative community responded enthusiastically and has been hard at work since then crafting art that will come alongside the teaching and worship to help our congregation engage the Psalms more deeply!

Each Sunday you will hear (and most weeks be invited to sing!) a new song and will see a reproduction of the visual art created for the Psalm. The original art piece will be displayed in the sanctuary near the stage. In September we are planning a night to play all of the songs together and will set up a gallery with all 15 art pieces.

Artist Statements

Visual Art:

Jeanne Johnston / Psalm 46 / watercolor gouache

Reading scripture is a daily practice, but responding to scripture is a God-given act. I paint in response to the scripture's language, how I feel, and God's quidance.

Psalm 46 gives me security, safety, and a feeling of calm because the Lord of Hosts is always with us. There is a river whose streams make glad the city of God...Come, behold the works of the Lord... He makes wars cease to the end of the earth....Be still and know that I am God (PSALM 46: 4, 8, 9, 10.)

This painting was done in watercolor gouache using only two colors, blue and yellow, to represent a simple river stream leading to God's assurance.

Having a baby has always been one of my deepest desires—but childbirth was one of my greatest fears. As I prepared to welcome our now nearly 3-month-old son, I wrote this song to cling to in moments of fear. Though labor was surprisingly smooth, I wasn't prepared for the overwhelming anxiety that followed postpartum. In a way I didn't expect, God has beautifully used these lyrics from Psalm 46 to comfort me when I struggled (and sometimes still do) to "be still and know." I pray this song brings peace to your heart in whatever chaotic, scary, or heartbreaking situation you're facing.

Call to Worship

Psalm 9:7-11

To God be the glory! It is easy in our sinful nature and cultural context to place ourselves at the center of things. It feels very natural for us to seek attention, approval, and our own glory. Worship beautifully disrupts and displaces us from the "center," calling us to turn our attention and affection to Jesus. In worship, we are reminded that our lives orbit God and that God deserves all of the glory!

Confession of Sin

Why do we confess sin? Worship both draws us to God and reveals where we are distant from him. Throughout Scripture, when people see or experience God they are faced with the reality of their own brokenness and shame. Likewise, we confess our sin, as a community and individually.

Words of Forgiveness

Why is it called "Words of Forgiveness?" There's a reason we don't call this element "The Forgiveness of Sins." As Protestants, we truly believe that there is only one mediator between God and humankind—Jesus Christ (1 Tim 2:5). Therefore, no pastor or priest can offer God's pardon...this is the work of Christ alone, given freely by and directly from Him! Therefore, we are assured that as we confess our sins and put our faith in Jesus Christ, He indeed does pardon us. Our pastors and leaders in worship merely offer this good news as it is proclaimed in Scripture (see 1 John 1:9).

Passing of the Peace

Why is the Greeting put after our Words of Forgiveness? The book of 2 Corinthians reminds us that part of God's goal in reconciling Himself to us was that we might likewise be reconciled with one another. But for healing and wholeness to take place in our relationships (which is what the Greeting enacts as we acknowledge one another in the peace of our Lord), we must first know the healing of our relationship with God through Christ. God's pardon of us sets us free to love and forgive one another without reservation or qualification!

Baptism

Remember your own baptism. As we participate in today's baptism with our vows and affirmation, allow it to be a time of recommitment to the Lord.

If you were baptized as an infant, think about how your baptism was a picture of your utter helplessness before God—how He found you, loved you, and clothed you with righteousness, even before you were able to choose and respond to Him.

If you were baptized as an older child or adult, think about how your baptism was a conscious public profession before people that you would follow Christ. Allow God's covenant to be renewed in your life today.

Scripture Reading

What is the benediction? Benediction is a word with Latin origin (bene = "well," and dicere = "to speak"); a benediction is a word which "speaks wellness/goodness" to us, therefore properly understood as a blessing. The benediction in worship has ancient roots, going back to the worship of God's people in the Temple. When we utilize the benediction in our worship, we connect ourselves with an ancient practice of God's people and join with them together in worship of our one great God.
